- Blockchain – Not just a form of artificial intelligence (AI), but it will transform the way we handle things like finance, and real estate, to name but a couple of everyday applications.
- Quantum Computing AI Applications - Quantum technology just became available for the public on the cloud. It's now ready to have a large impact providing answers to problems that couldn't be solved before. Major applications are expected in health care, trading and in cybersecurity.
- 5G mobile networks – Both Vodafone and Spark have announced they will be forging ahead with the high speed fifth generation mobile network. 5G is theoretically 100 times faster than 4G and its supposed to be faster than a typical home cable internet connection today!
- Flexible Smartphone – It seems after many broken promises the bendy smartphone with become available in 2019, Galaxy F from Samsung appear to have their heads above the water!
- Wearable technology – not just the smartwatch but keep an eye out for smart shoes and smart belts!

1. Google

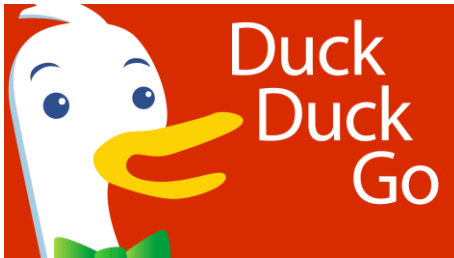
However, this “King” also tracks its “subjects” and gains an unbelievable amount of information that most of us don't realise, or if we do pay scant regard.

Many of us have discovered you can get the same look for a lot less using the OralB power toothbrush, though it's not hard to spot the real one, and don't try using the AirPod to clean your teeth!



Bendy Smartphones are on their way!

The Samsung Galaxy F (F for foldable) launch has been rumoured for a few years – it's the firm's foldable, flexible, bendable smartphone. Back in 2011 it was thought they were “nearly” ready to launch the product but now “those in the know” are suggesting a world-wide launch may occur in February. Portable devices bulk-up up our pockets and handbags and because the screens are getting bigger then the more awkward they have become. Hence its only natural that manufacturers have been working hard to find ways to bend or fold them.

These bendy phones are likely to be fairly expensive, possibly even as much as \$3,000 – the price you pay to be an early adopter! Apparently, the Samsung phone is a clamshell-style and it flattens out for a tablet-size display. The Infinity Flex Display, as the tech is called, is a new direction for Samsung smartphones - that required development of new materials and processes to make it functional. The dad was frustrated that after buying his son a smartphone it thought he would be more in touch with the Lad – as it turned out the Lad more often than not ignored the father's message, preferring to play games on the device instead!

ReplyASAP allows you to send messages to people you've connected with via the App.

The message will appear on their phone over what-ever they are doing, and make a noise until they interact with it, even if the phone is on silent.

You will then get notification that it has been read and their location, so in many ways it will provide a sense of relief for frustrated parents and even partners!

Its early days yet but over 100,000 downloads have occurred and its being upgraded with other features.
